On the 20th February of this year John French received his M.B.E. from The Prince of Wales at the Investiture in Buckingham Palace, “For services to the Community of Barton-upon-Humber, Lincolnshire” . When approached to provide information for an article for the Bartonian regarding his Award, John was his usual modest self and could not understand why such an article was needed!!

I did however get a quote from him, “I was proud to receive the M.B.E. at Buckingham Palace as a representative of Barton-upon-Humber. It was overwhelming to be recognised in the New Year Honours List; I am even more overcome at all the messages of endorsement I have received. Barton is a lovely town, and I am delighted that it is thought I might have been of some use; this is reward enough. I thank all my friends and family, including those who are now not with us, for their example, support and encouragement. It is on their behalf that I accept the honour.”

John a Barton man born and bred, has been a member of Barton Civic Society for 30 years, serving as chairman for many years and now vice-president.

He started his working life at Barton Urban District Council in 1964 as an environmental health officer after attending Castledyke Primary School and Caistor Grammar School. John worked in local government for over 30 years, and also was a member of Barton Town Council for seven years.

John is now retired, but keeps himself busy with his work for the Civic Society, which has involved clearing up unsightly areas in the town, and planting trees and shrubs to improve the townscape, as well as attending meetings. John also works hard for the Church, where he has undertaken positions of Churchwarden, Secretary of the Parochial Church Council, and Chairman of the St Mary's Men's Society. He was part of the team of bell ringers until he sustained broken ribs.

John was instrumental in bringing English Heritage experts to examine 51 Fleetgate, ensuring that it was acquired by the Glanford Building Preservation Trust, and renovated with aid of grants from English Heritage. An amateur historian, John also studied the early history of a group of Victorian buildings in the town centre, as a result he was a founder member of the Queen Street School Preservation Trust.

John is also involved in encouraging tourism, and spends a lot of time acting as a guide, showing parties of visitors round the town, and telling them about it's history.

THE WEATHER IN BARTON DURING 2001

Some 681 mm (26¾ ins) of rain fell on Barton during the year 2001. This was some 100 mm (4 ins) less than in 2000 – the year of the floods – and brought to an end six years continuously rising total rain fall: 1995 – 491 mm, 1996 – 532mm, 1997 – 542 mm, 1998 – 588mm, 199 – 649 mm and 2000 – 788 mm.

Monthly average temperatures in °C were – high first, low second – as follows:

January 4.5—5	April 12.25-4.5	July 22.5--14	October 16—10
February 7.5—1	May 17—8	August 23.5--14.5	November 10—4
March 9—2.5	June 20—11	September 17—11	December 6—0

The year's hottest day was on 15 August when a temperature of 31°C was recorded; the coldest on 22 December when, during the night, the temperature dropped to -3°C.

Queen Street School Mural

The 24 new panels, which have been erected on the front of Queen Street School, are a result of work with a ceramic artist, Alex Hallowes and Barton schools over the past 18 months. Funded by the Community Heritage Arts & Media project (CHAMP) a Barton Single Regeneration Budget project the stunning clay tiles were designed with input from the 3 Barton primary schools and then made by Year nine pupils from Baysgarth School. Art teacher Sarah Valentine worked closely with the artists and made sure the work was fired over the summer holidays last year.

The decision to work with clay was made after CHAMP produced the video on Tile making in Barton set in the Blythe Tileyard. Clay and the production of brick and tile features in the history of Barton and using it as a base for the mural gave school pupils experience of a new material. The children's designs are based around subject areas such as biology, geography, history etc.

David Jackson of the Queen Street School Preservation Trust was pleased to accept the temporary murals which it is hoped will be incorporated in the development of the school in future years.

Down The Garden

I sat in my living room the other day (in February when this was written) and an adult vine weevil decided to alight on my knee, a mistake on its part, but it illustrated how the general warming of the climate has extended the range and seasons of pests. Vine weevil has progressed from relative obscurity to number 2 in the charts of the top ten garden pests. Slugs and snails still hang on at number 1. Symptoms of weevil attack include poor growth, wilting and death of the plant. On examination large white grubs will be found amongst the compost, they will have devoured the plant roots. Adult weevils eat notches in the leaf edges. Apart from the weather, vine weevil seems to prefer peat-based composts, I've found that using soil based with a dressing of largish gravel does deter them. There are chemical compost additives on the market, but some concern has been shown about health risks. Organically, nematodes are available to water into the compost; these invade the body of the pest and dispatch within a couple of days.

With this being the Queen's Golden Jubilee Year there has been a plethora of new introductions of plants to celebrate this anniversary, including 'Gracious Queen' a golden rose specially commissioned for charity and introduced by James Cocker & Sons. A Dahlia called 'Golden Jubilee' by Taylor's Bulbs, Rudbekia 'Golden Jubilee' by Webbs, and Robert Mattock has produced a number of container roses including 'Royal Bride', 'Crowing Glory' and 'Her Majesty'. If you do put in some new roses try to avoid a site which has already been used for roses, or they could suffer from rose replant sickness. Try underplanting with garlic, which is said to deter aphids.

New varieties to try

The first yellow impatiens (Busy Lizzie) to go on the market, New Guinea 'Vision', has been developed, but will not be available generally until next year, a pity it would have gone down well in this golden year. On the edible side, the R.H.S. have been trialing a multisweet sweetcorn which is claimed to have higher sugar levels and a thin core to the cob, giving a greater percentage of grain, I look forward to the results with interest.

Sutton's have introduced a new courgette 'El Greco' a disease resistant F1 hybrid with good flavour and recently given the Award of Garden Merit.

Dobies offer new tomatoes suitable for hanging baskets including 'Tumbling Tom Red' and sharper flavoured 'Tumbling Tom Yellow'. Other introductions include a deep purple podded French bean 'Purpiat' and 3 Swiss chard cultivars; white stemmed 'Silverado', orange 'Fantasia' and 'Bright Yellow'.

We are growing *Scorzonera hispanica* 'Duplex' for the first time for a number of years. Also known as black salsify, sown now it can be grown for its edible roots (said to taste like oysters, though I don't know if they have the same effects), or left to over winter in the ground, cut back the foliage to 1" above the crown and earth them up to about 6". The shoots will be ready by March for cutting and can be used like 'chicons'.

'The Garden Centre' which first appeared in 1961 has in many cases become rather distant from actual plants, and the ones they do sell are often shipped miles, it's a pity as there are some very good nurseries about. Locally why not try the Palm Farm at Thornton Curtis, well worth a visit just to look at the palm garden. Westshores Nursery in West Street, Winterton is another, with a large variety of grasses to choose from.

Community Regeneration Committee

The activities continued to grow within the remit of the Community Regeneration Committee of the Town Council during the past year, and inevitable circumstances forced the Committee to introduce new elements into events. These new elements have given us the opportunities to advance the much-desired active participation of Barton residents, and organisations to the benefit of us all, it has also provided us with the means to improve and polish events for the enjoyment of a wider range of people.

The Committee used to opportunity owing to the forced absence of the reindeer through Foot and Mouth Disease, to introduce the theme parade that proved to be a success well beyond that originally envisaged, this gives us the chance to improve that idea for future events.

The Barton Bike Night, last year continued to grow into what is now regarded as one of the jewels in Barton's crown. The committee is determined to ensure the success and future of this event, and has already taken steps to this regard.


The Town Councils Accounts are public documents and can be viewed at the Council Office in the Assembly Rooms between 9.00am and 1.00pm on Monday to Friday. In line with Local Government legislation they are audited annually by our assigned Auditors Robson Rhodes, who gave us a clean bill of health for our 2000/2001 accounts. Our own Audit Group carries out quarterly audit trails on your behalf and we thank them for their diligence. New legislation will result in changes to the way our accounts are prepared and audited in future. Mr I Glover kindly stayed on to under take our budget documentation and to prepare the accounts for the year to 31st March 2002, after this our new Town Clerk and Finance Officer, Mrs R Hibbert will take over this responsibility.

Mrs Hibbert's job also includes the management of the Assembly Rooms and in this the Assembly Rooms Sub-committee will support her. Investigations are already underway to ensure that we meet Health & Safety, Fire, Licensing regulations and Disability access requirements. Our reviews will include the present charges and letting conditions, improvements to make the facilities more user friendly and a strategy for the future.

We have appointed a new caretaker Mr Ian Bromfield, and thank him for his hard work.

Like all organisations, we seem to be bombarded by legislation which require us to document procedures and adopt policies for a wide range of activities from personnel, Health & Safety, risk assessment to financial and equal opportunities. All this takes time, which means that we have had to increase our staff hours. The Barton Regeneration

Councillor Neil Turner (Chair)

The Single Regeneration Budget (SRB), which in 1996 we were, it is fair to say, very lucky to get, is finally at an end.

I have to say that over the last six years chairing the partnership tasked with developing the successful bid and delivering the projects it produced has brought both satisfaction and frustration in equal measure. Nonetheless overall the original aims have been met and I am confident that when the final evaluation of the scheme, which has to be done under the funding rules, is complete, the scheme will be shown not only to have delivered, but with value for money.

It is worth reflecting on the original bid and how SRB works. In 1996 when the then new North Lincs Council decided to support a bid for Barton, a series of events and workshops were set up through the summer looking for both consultation and project ideas. The highest profile went to the organised groups, built environment and tourism were high on the agenda. There were few people outside of local authority and voluntary sector calling for support for youth, drug awareness, social issues, unemployment, training and the too long neglected housing in some areas of the town. These were of course what Government wanted to see at the heart of any scheme. Of the wards that make up Barton Parish; Park and Bridge, Park in 1996 at least had far and away the highest deprivation indicator scores. Indeed, Park ward had the highest in North Lincs outside of Crosby. This was largely because of Caistor Road estate and to a lesser extent Overton Court. Bluntly, a bid would have not succeeded without largescale support for Caistor Road. Of the money spent on the estate around a quarter is SRB, by the way, the rest is from Housing budgets. Interestingly the Civil servants questioned whether we'd put *enough* money in for the estate.

There have been clear improvements in the appearance of the town because of the SRB money, 51 Fleetgate, the old Clinic, the High Street scheme, the Ropery, the Central Garage car park, Youth Centre improvements, the Resource Centre and many smaller though visible schemes. In the old clinic, Connexions, now a model for other areas and the Child centre, the Baysgarth fans project, these are just examples of our involvement and financial support.

The Queen Street School now looks set fair for a resolution because of SRB support in putting together a Heritage Lottery Bid, out of which it has gained stage one funding, meaning that the emphasis has shifted in favour of success. Too often to mention here, over the years we've been asked to support different schemes, and it sometimes has felt as though the regeneration scheme has had a finger in every pie in the town at one time or another.

Watersedge deserves a separate mention, if only because it is so important to the Town and therefore has been to the scheme, over a million pounds of Landfill Tax Credits has been drawn into the site because of SRB and the main funding for the reclamation work was freed because it came under the scheme.

Finally, the many people who along with the partnership members have volunteered their time to make all of this happen, including the members of the Residents Associations, Senior Alliance, Chamber of Trade, Wilderspin Group, Champ Trustees and all other groups formed under the scheme, I would like to thank formally.

First Annual Report of the Relief Road Working Party

The Working Party met for the first time on February 4th this year. It identified a strategy for resolving the problems in Barton caused by increased traffic throughout the town. Short and long term measures have been listed. Initially the drive will be to reduce the problems on the existing network while examining the need for a relief road. If an relief road proves an appropriate solution then the Working Party will investigate alternative routes and sources of funding. It is recognised from the start that a wide range of interests will need to be involved given the complex nature of Barton's industrial / residential mix, its geographical location, the local socio-economic structure and lastly its environmental and historical prominence

At present the major source of complaint relates to the movement of large lorries through the town, or more accurately, to the noise they generate and to the movement of light vehicles at times of shift change. In respect of the noise the Council has already contacted some of the Utility companies with a request to make good the more noticeable rattling ironware at various locations along the route of the A1077 through the town.

Members of the working party are to carry out a walking survey of the A1077 route (on Monday March 25th) to locate and reference defective reinstatements so the owners can be made aware of the disturbance caused and the need for urgent maintenance.

Local industry has been contacted and asked for their help in working with the Working Party. North Lincolnshire Council will be contacted with regard to road safety issues and for assistance with identification of reinstatement owners.

CAN YOU IDENTIFY THESE HOPPER EMPLOYEES?

My thanks to everyone who responded to my request for information on the Elswick-Hopper Company in the last edition of the Bartonian. I still have several people to talk to, so if you are waiting for me to call, please be patient. If you have information and have not called yet, please do so. I was fortunate to be loaned this photograph by Audrey Cole, whose father is pictured sitting at the front on the right, holding a dress case. This had been presented to Freddie Hopper, the son of the founder, by the staff on his twenty first birthday. It last appeared in a local paper in 1972, 60 years after it was taken outside the entrance to the Hopper Cycle Works and a year before Freddie died. The plaque he is holding states:

"We the undersigned being members of the staff and foremen of Messrs. F. Hopper & Co. Ltd. St. Mary's Works, have great pleasure in offering you our heartiest congratulations on the attainment of your majority and would be pleased if you would accept this dressing case as a token of the high esteem in which you are held by us.

We also wish to express the hope that you will enjoy good health and prosperity and be spared to spend many happy returns of the day with us."

The list of names tallies with those pictured, so if you can identify anyone, please let me know. So far I have firm identities on eight:

Fred Hopper 7th from left, first row.

Henry Cole, cross-legged, right side.

Thomas Henry Bate, extreme right, second row, whose son E.G. Bate, sent in the photograph in 1972.

Bill Tomlinson, 4th from left, second row.

C.W. Shakesby extreme right, front row.

George Franklin 4th from left, back row.

Joseph Small 2nd from right, third row back.

Harry Pond 3rd from left, front row.

Barratt 5th from left, front row.

The listing is taken from a postcard of the plaque shown in the photograph, with a full list of signatures. These are very clear, but I may have misread some of the initials. The numbers can only be the donations given, in old pennies, so Joseph Small, who was foreman of the assembly shop, was sufficiently well paid to be able to afford 1s 6d, or 7½p in "new" money. Young Henry Cole, aged 12 at the time, gave 2d, probably a big slice of his week's wages! We know that in 1913, as a junior clerk, Henry was paid 7s per week. In the same week, Joseph Small was paid "2 2s. It does not sound a lot, but £1 bought a lot of things in 1912.

So, get out the family albums and see if you can identify a grandfather, or great grandfather. This is such a good photograph that I would like to include it in the book I am working on, if possible with all the faces named. Call me on 01652 633363 or email me at ndland@btinternet.com. On The Barton Beat

Welcome to another edition of 'Barton Beat'. I am PC 862 Dave Atkinson and I will be writing articles in the future for this publication. Firstly I would like to thank PC Tony Douce for his good work in the past and wish him a long and happy retirement when he finishes some time in May.

As most of you will be aware we now operate a policing system involving Local Policing Teams or LPT's as they are commonly called, so Barton is now Barton LPT. For local reasons Inspector Griffiths has kept to the beat areas as before with Barton Town as B213 area, Barton now has seven dedicated constables who are myself, PC 769 Howard Lowe, PC 1602 Jo Szynal, PC 1399 Rob Hutchinson, PC 1877 Lisa Thirkettle, PC 1537 Steve Watts and of course Tony Douce who as I mentioned is close to his retirement.

For those not familiar with the system we operate with regard to crimes or any extra police action I would like to explain. When a crime is reported in Barton it is initially recorded on our 'Command and Control' system, an officer then visits the victim of the crime if required and all details recorded on a paper report. If further enquiries are necessary then this is submitted to our supervision who will allocate it to an officer, not necessarily the officer who made the initial visit. Other non-crime matters are similarly dealt with, but the original officer will usually follow up any enquiries without further recourse to supervision. It goes without saying that if you have a problem then let us know because 'We can't fix it if we don't know it's broke'.

In future articles I will be covering particular problem areas in depth, such as underage drinking, youths causing general annoyance, criminal damage involving graffiti and any traffic enforcement campaigns.

I hope to have a successful relationship with The Bartonian in the years to come.

BAYSGARTH SCHOOL STARTS A NEW ERA OF SUCCESS

Best Ever Exam Results for Barton upon Humber

Some outstanding, individual achievements. The school achieved its highest A*-C pass rate at GCSE with 47% of pupils gaining 5 grades of C and above. This was together with 96% pupils gaining more than one GCSE. The A level average score was 19.5 points making Baysgarth one of the top performing sixth forms in the area. It is not surprising that we have our largest ever 6th Form this year.

Mayor opens £1 million new facilities

Major building and refurbishment at Baysgarth were opened by Councillor Margaret Simpson, Mayor of North Lincolnshire, in January 2002, including a new Art Block, 2 Modern Language Labs, New dining hall, extended Library and a weather protected, social area. These new facilities are to increase the accommodation at the School, after the closure of the old Lower School buildings and bringing all pupils onto one site. The Annexe has been fully refurbished as the English Department, with new classrooms, a 20 strong computer suite and a multi-media studio.

First for Hi-Tech Teaching Aids

Baysgarth is one of the first schools in North Lincolnshire to use interactive white boards to help deliver the curriculum. These are in Science, Maths, Geography, Languages and ICT with more planned for September. A great boon for teachers and pupils alike. We have doubled our computer facilities to 4 IT suites, linked to the RM Network with a fast broadband internet access. On-line learning has also taken off with 180 pupils accessing their GNVQ courses through the internet.

Taking Expressive Arts out to the Community

Head of Expressive Arts, Ian Barber, has won New Opportunities Funding to enable Baysgarth to take Arts Workshops out to ten primary schools in our area. A magnificent achievement for Baysgarth and an exciting prospect for the children in Barton and village schools.

All this, on top of the successful Ofsted Report in 2000, shows how much Baysgarth is committed to continually improving the quality of education for all its pupils.

A History of Barton upon Humber Grammar School 1931 – 1975

A book detailing the history of Barton Grammar School was launched on Saturday 16th March 2002. Written and compiled by Enid Brice it has been published by the Barton SRB project, CHAMP. Enid explains in the introduction to the book that, *'While visiting a Barton friend in August 1999, I learned from the Town Council's publication, The Bartonian, that research into the history of the town's schools, initiated by CHAMP at the Baysgarth House Museum, had brought to light no official records of Barton Grammar School.'* This started two years of research and writing which has led to the newly launched book.

Much of the archive material used for the book has now been donated to Baysgarth Museum by Enid Brice and is available to view by contacting Helen Danson at CHAMP on (01652) 632318. The books priced £9 is on sale at Newtons Printers and The Ropewalk. The archive material, both photographic and documentary, is now in the Museum (although they may of course not yet be ready to have it available to the public).

Jacob's Well Appeal

I have been working supporting this Christian charity for the past twelve years. However, many people within our local community will possibly be unaware of the charity and the international work that it undertakes. Hence my being moved to write this article.

The Jacob's Well Appeal was set up many years ago by Dr Beryl Beynon (a General Medical Practitioner) and her husband, Peter. It is based at the Jacob's Well Christian Bookshop in Beverley, East Yorkshire.

It exists to provide an outlet for charitable aid, such as medicines, clothing and food, to the poorer Eastern countries and, more recently, the so-called, Third World countries. The aid is usually delivered in lorry containers, by road, driven by volunteers from the charity.

Examples of its work during the past year are as follows:

1. Since 1990 Jacob's Well has worked in the Spital de Copii Hospital for handicapped children in Siret, Romania where 500 children had their home.
2. Work in Afghanistan has been continued for some years. Even prior to the repercussions of the atrocities of September 11th 2001, the World Food Programme was predicting that 5 million Afghans would die of starvation, disease and the cold this winter. This figure will now be surpassed since the effects of the war. It was there fore even more rewarding to know that, through hard diplomacy, a container of mostly medicines (worth £140,000) and a 46 Kilo box of blood grouping serum for the Kabul Central Blood Bank was successfully delivered to Kabul just before the bombing started. The charity continues to work closely with the Red Crescent Society in getting aid trough the various road and border blocks, to the benefit of the population of Afghanistan.
3. Recently the charity has been able to register a branch in the Ukraine. This will enable aid to be got through the almost impregnable Ukraine customs.
4. In the summer of 2001, a container was sent to the SOS charity in Poland, with some aid for the flood victims.
5. During 2001 two containers have been delivered to Bulgaria, one to Pazardjik and one to the Transport Medical Institute in Sofia. In December 2001, a request was received from the Agency for International Aid to continue our help for this country, as there is great need at present.

Assistance to the charity comes from all directions:

For example, prior t to a trip to Afghanistan last year, with the words of the World Food Programme's warning predicting starvation for 5 million Afghans ringing in the ears of Dr Beynon, Weetabix sent the charity two trucks full of Alpen and Weetabix. The Lord's words "I was hungry and you feed me....." spring to mind.

Charity at Home:

The charity runs a Day Centre and Rehabilitation unit in Beverley. Through this unit, older children within the community are integrated into voluntary work within the community. In this respect, Lloyds/TSB Foundation has agreed to fund a part-time volunteer' co-ordinator to increase the work amongst the disabled and those with mental illness.

How You Can Help:

Sadly, we are not allowed to re-cycle unused drugs and dressings etc. for the NHS! Therefore, all unused items returned to the dispensary at the Central Surgery, Barton on Humber are packaged up and I deliver them to the Jacob's Well charity. (I can only say 'thank goodness for the Landrover Discovery' as the load is often a considerable one!) However, I am aware that what I take is a mere token of what is thrown away or returned through the local chemists rather than to the surgery. I would therefore ask all residents of Barton upon Humber and the surrounding villages to return their unused drugs, dressings and appliances to the dispensary at the Central Surgery from where, I can assure you, they will be sent to some very deserving causes.
